What will happen to me if I decide to take part?

We will talk with you.

We will audio record this conversation. A company approved by the University will write down what you said. Once we receive and check it, we will delete the recording.

Do I have to take part?



No

It is up to you.

If you say 'NO', it will not affect your care.

Are there any good things about taking part?



You could be helping us to take actions that may help others.

What about bad things?

Talking about some things may make you feel upset.

Tell us if you feel upset. We can stop and offer you support.

What happens to my information?

We will keep your information only to ourselves.

Your information will only be seen by people in the research team like us and



people who check the research is being done properly.

We will not use your name or anything that tells who you are in anything we write about this study.

Information will be kept for ten years after the study ends.



Will I get any help when I take part?
